

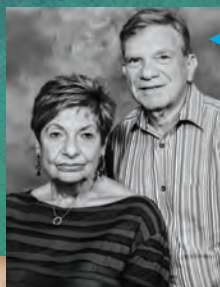

On a behind-the-scenes tour of Mease Countryside Hospital in 2019, Peter and Paula were able to see how the expansion of the new Bilheimer Tower would positively impact the community with upgraded facilities, cutting-edge technology and increased number of patient beds. Margaret Ranzman and Gary Holcomb are just starting to enjoy retirement after working 46 years in the stuffed toy industry; jobs which often required them to travel to Asia. At the beginning of the pandemic, because of their relationships with manufacturers in Asia, Margaret and Gary were able to get hard-

to-find face masks, which they donated to first responders.

Margaret used to work 16 hours a day between designing new toys, creating the samples, marketing them to stores and then producing the final product. While everyone knows how much children love stuffed toys, they're both quick to point out that seniors share that same admiration. While Gary's mom was a patient at Morton Plant Hospital, he recalls how comforted she felt when he brought her a white angora stuffed cat. Margaret and Gary have always made it a point to donate toys to hospitals and schools, especially around the holidays, in hopes that something as simple as hugging or holding a stuffed toy will help their anxiety.

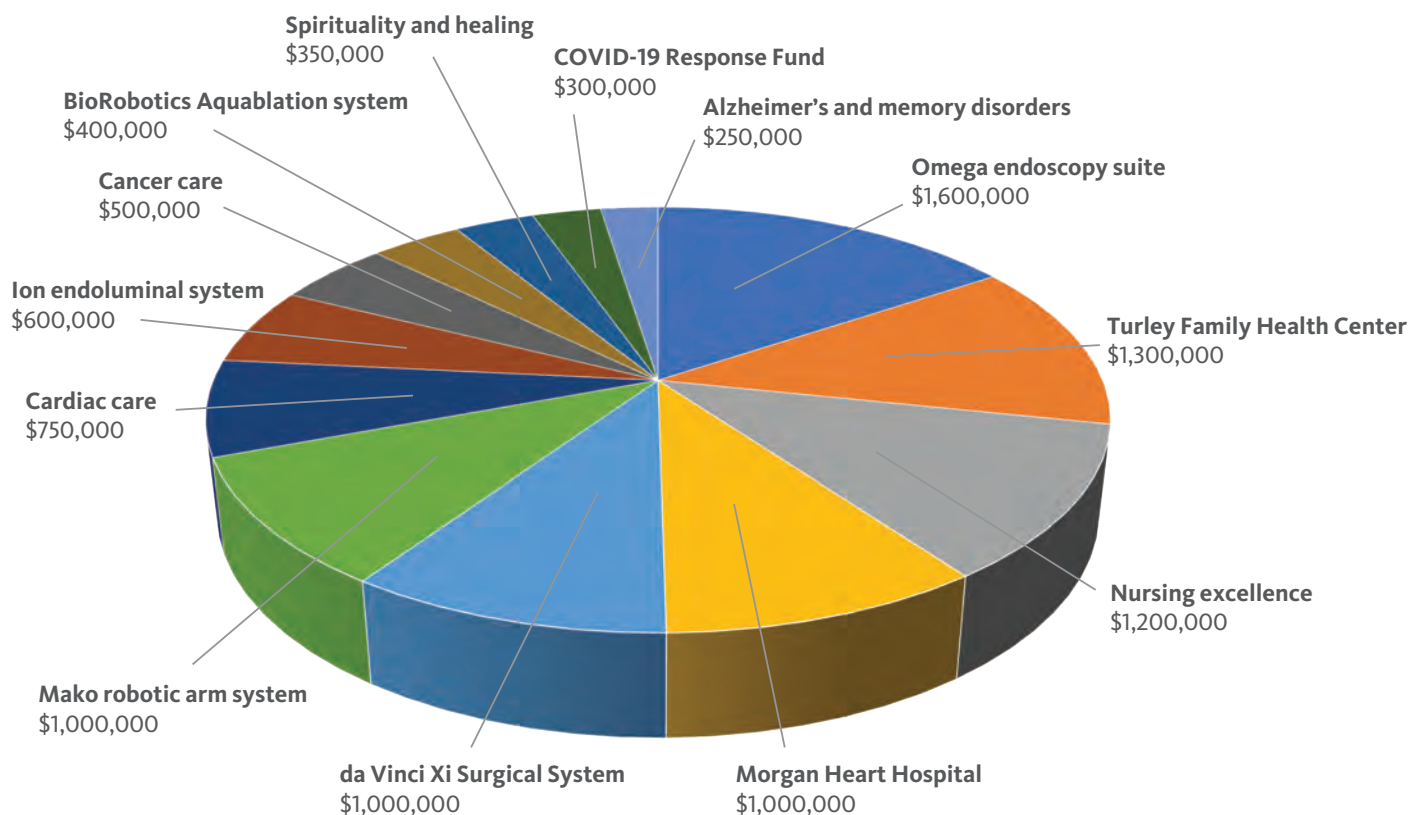

Your gifts continue a legacy of excellence and contribute to lifesaving programs and technologies that have revolutionized patient care.

## Ion Robotic-Assisted Surgical System

This robotic-assisted surgical system helps patients battling lung cancer. Physicians can biopsy smaller and more difficult-to-reach tissue, which may lead to earlier diagnoses, faster treatment and better outcomes.

## Simulation Training and Education

Simulation technology gives our nursing education team the opportunity to practice skills that let them become more competent in performing the difficult and critical care that's necessary to be a safe practitioner.

## Omega Endoscopy Suite

Morton Plant Hospital's new Omega endoscopy suite for complex pulmonary and gastrointestinal cases provides HD-quality images and more accurate fluoroscopy, while reducing radiation exposure to patients.



## Health and Wellness Demonstration Kitchen

The Turley Family Health Center will soon offer a demonstration kitchen focused on educating their family medicine residents on how to teach patients about nutrition and diet as they relate to improved disease management, disease prevention and wellness.

## COVID-19 Response Fund

The COVID-19 Response Fund was created in 2020 due to the overwhelming desire from our community to support our caregivers with meals and recognition, as well as urgent medical resources, including Tru-D® SmartUVC disinfection technology to help sanitize patient rooms.

## Nursing Recognition

To be proactive in the face of a global nursing shortage, philanthropy helps our hospitals attract, reward, recognize and retain talented nurses while giving them the tools they need to advance in the nursing profession.

## Planting the Seeds of Philanthropy

Dr. Yves Gabriel, Foundation board member, vascular surgeon and chair of BayCare's vascular service line steering committee, was destined to practice medicine at Morton Plant Hospital.

While interviewing for his general surgery residency at the St. Luke's-Roosevelt Hospital Medical Center in New York City, he recalls walking through the front doors of the main building into one of the grandest lobbies he had ever seen. "It seemed as though I was transported to the lobbies of yesteryear, where men wore top hats and blazers to go to the grocery store and women routinely dressed as though they were coming from a photo shoot for a glamour magazine," recalls Dr. Gabriel. "It instilled a peaceful sense of wonder during a very anxious and stressful day."

While researching the move of the St. Luke's-Roosevelt Hospital Medical Center to the new, multicampus Mount Sinai Medical System, he learned that two of these original six buildings that he routinely frequented since that first interview had been named national historical buildings as part of the 2002 Landmarks Preservation Commission Designation Report. While there, he couldn't help but notice a prominent name above the front door of the main building – Plant.

The Plant Pavilion at St. Luke's Hospital was built from donations provided by Margaret J. Plant, the second wife and widow of Henry B. Plant, founder of the Plant System of railroads and steamship lines. In fact, Morton Plant Hospital in Clearwater was named for Henry's son. Margaret became a major philanthropist after Henry's passing and continued the Plant tradition of providing resources for their community in such a way that the lives of many can forever be changed.

"It should come as no surprise how a young immigrant born in the Democratic Republic of Congo to Haitian parents, who came to the shores of the United States to pursue the American dream, can come to be touched by the story of such a distinguished philanthropic family, and then himself continue to write the story of giving with a pure and open heart," says Dr. Gabriel.

Dr. Gabriel goes on to state that it has been an honor to serve on the Foundation Board of Directors to support activities that benefit the surrounding community and directly impacts the lives of those who call it home.

## Donor Bill of Rights

### Donor Bill of Rights

Philanthropy is based on voluntary action for the common good. It's a tradition of giving and sharing that's primary to the quality of life. To ensure that philanthropy merits the respect and trust of the general public, and that donors and prospective donors can have full confidence in the nonprofit organizations and causes they're asked to support, we declare that all donors have these rights:

- I. To be informed of the organization's mission, of the way the organization intends to use donated resources and of its capacity to use donations effectively for their intended purposes
- II. To be informed of the identity of those serving on the organization's governing board, and to expect the board to exercise prudent judgment in its stewardship responsibilities
- III. To have access to the organization's most recent financial statements
- IV. To be assured their gifts will be used for the purposes for which they were given
- V. To receive appropriate acknowledgement and recognition
- VI. To be assured that information about their donation is handled with respect and with confidentiality to the extent provided by law
- VII. To expect that all relationships with individuals representing organizations of interest to the donor will be professional in nature
- VIII. To be informed whether those seeking donations are volunteers, employees of the organization or hired solicitors
- IX. To have the opportunity for their names to be deleted from mailing lists that an organization may intend to share
- X. To feel free to ask questions when making a donation and to receive prompt, truthful and forthright answers
